Alumni Spotlight

Chuck Dingée: "We are The Walrus"

Hobart High School alumnus Chuck Dingée, Class of 1971, is a musician with a group called The Walrus. Chuck has lived in Bellingham, Washington for the last 20 years. Here is his story.

What are you up to these days? How do you make your living and how do you spend your time?

I am playing lots of music, which is (mostly) how I make my living. I also have a small home business building and maintaining web sites, and I occasionally do some photography work.

I play acoustic guitar and sing as a solo or in a few different duos and trios, and I have a really fun 5-piece band called The Walrus. We all sing, and I play rhythm guitar, flute, sax, and occasionally congas. Check us out at www.tusktusk.com. My wife (Kathy Sheehan) and I are loving life in the Pacific Northwest. We have a 36' sailboat that we share with two other couples here in Bellingham, Washington, and we spend many summer weekends cruising in the San Juan Islands. We also love to hike and hunt for delicious wild mushrooms.

A lot of musicians wish they could make their living from playing, but not many get to. Is it difficult depending on music for a living?

It is often challenging to survive on the low income, but it is very rewarding to be an artist or musician. Of course it can be difficult to deal with the business aspects of playing music. You have to strike a balance between the music you like to play and the music your clientele wants to hear. You have to be able to read an audience to know what is appropriate, so it helps to have a versatile, diverse repertoire. And you have to be able to deal with audiences that are not paying attention to you in bars. It takes some getting used to but I always find people to play to.

Can you describe the path that led you from Hobart High School to Bellingham, Washington? What kinds of things happened along the way?

Well, after High School I went to IU Northwest in Glen Park for a few years. I had a scholarship in Math and French, so I majored in Math and minored in French. I found that what I really loved to do was play music with my friends, and eventually I dropped out and became a hippie musician, traveling around the country with fellow Hobart grads Rich and Dave Franzwa. We called ourselves the Obscure Travelling Band. We spent time in Wisconsin, Colorado, Florida, and other places and eventually ended up in the Bellingham, where we fell in love with the NW. After living in Bellingham for a couple of years, people started asking us: "When are you gonna either leave town or change the name of the band?" So we left town. We travelled back to Colorado, and came back to Hobart to visit friends & family. Then we moved to Florida, where the band broke up, and I moved back to Bellingham.

For a few years (1986-1993) I lived in Philadelphia where I worked for the World Game Institute, an

offshoot of Buckminster Fuller's office. We conducted a simulation game taking place on the world's largest & most accurate map of the world. It was the size of a basketball court. We put participants on the map in the same proportions as world population, and then distributed props representing food, energy, literacy, money and debt and then gave the regions problems to solve, given the resources they had. It was a very interesting experience, and I got to travel all over the world presenting the workshop for colleges, high schools, corporations, and many organizations including the United Nations in NY and the Diplomatic Corps in Washington DC.

Eventually my wife and I moved back to Bellingham, where I continued to work with the World Game for a while and started building web sites and eventually formed my band.

Were there any teachers or experiences in the Hobart schools, or growing up in Hobart, that led you to where you are today?

I did have some great teachers at Hobart. I was very close to Mr. Wuchner, who I had every year for either French or Math. And of course the HHS Band was a very big part of my high school experience. I remember my first day of band class (7th grade) when Mr. Bondi said "I want you to know right now that I think this is the most important class you have." I remember thinking "This guy's nuts!" But I grew quickly to learn that music is to be taken seriously, and I cherish my years in band with Mr. Bondi, Mr. Grivetti, and Mr. Matlock.

Do you have any advice for high school students today who would like to go into music for a career?

Don't expect to make much money! But be professional. Take every gig seriously, even if it doesn't pay much. A professional attitude really helps with getting gigs, and winning over audiences.


