Alumni Spotlight

Alex Ramos, Newly-Retired Hobart Brickies Wrestling Coach

Our *Alumni Spotlight* this issue is on Alex Ramos, Class of 2000 alumnus, who has recently stepped down as Head Wrestling Coach at Hobart High School.

What is your current position at Hobart High School, and what are you involved in these days?

This is my 8th year teaching at Hobart High School. I have been teaching: AP Psychology, Psychology I & II and for the last two years I have been teaching sociology.

I have been involved with the Psychology Club here at HHS and have helped provide opportunities for students to get experience volunteering with outside organizations that primarily deal with individuals living with mental or physical disabilities.

This will be my first year as the Social Studies Academic Team Sponsor and am excited to take my coaching into the academic realm.

I have also been working with a group of staff members and students to host our second TEDx event here at Hobart High School that will be taking place at the end of this school year.

Can you trace the path from the time you graduated from Hobart up to the present?

After leaving Hobart I wrestled at Purdue University for one and a half years, after which I had a falling out with the sport. I finished my Degree in Law and Society in 2006 and moved to Evansville, IN and married my best friend Sarah who I met while at Purdue. I was a store manager down there for two years before moving back to the Region to raise a family. The distributing industry took a turn in 2008 and I lost my job and started volunteer coaching at Hobart under Steve Balash.

I enjoyed Coaching so much and spending time with students that I started substitute teaching the following year. Needless to say, I fell in love with teaching and went back to school to earn my Master's in the Art of Education at Calumet College of St. Joseph.

I have since had the amazing opportunity to teach, work with and learn from over 1,000 different students.

Tell us about your wrestling days when you were a student at Hobart, including your school records and state championships.

This is always an interesting question, since talking about myself is not my strong suit, so I will keep it short. I wrestled all four years while a student at Hobart, I tried other sports, but wrestling seemed to be what I wanted to spend most of my time doing. My freshman year I made it to semi-state and was disqualified for an illegal slam ending my season with 26 wins and 7 losses. My sophomore year I placed 5th in the state and ended the season 40 wins and 1 loss. My Junior year I took first at state and finished the season with 45 wins and no losses. During my senior year, I placed first in the state with 37 wins and no losses. I finished my high school career with 148 wins against 8 losses. I placed 8th my senior year at the high school nationals earning All-American status.

What coaches, teachers or other people had the greatest influence on you and your career?

This question is easier to answer considering I had two of the greatest male role models in my life as coaches. Don Rogers and Steve Balash. They each played their respective roles at different times in my life. Don Rogers was/is like a father to me. I remember the first time I was at his house with my brother in the 4th grade 29 years ago. He was there by my side during the best and worst times in my life. I cannot say enough

about Don Rogers that would do justice for the support and love he has shown me. I am grateful to have him and his wife Jackie in my life and now a part of my wife & children's lives as well.

It's not that Steve Balash wasn't there for me in high school, because he was and has always been a wonderful role model in my life. It's just that he played a more important role when I began coaching. Who better to turn to for advice about coaching than the man who has dedicated his life to serving others. Currently in his 47th year coaching three sports (you do the math to figure out how many seasons that is). Steve Balash is the embodiment of servant leadership and has taught me much more than what it means to be a coach, but a friend and father as well.

There are many others to thank for successes that my life has had, but none more than my mother Martha Rivas-Ramos. She was and will continue to be a tremendous influence on my life. As a single mother who raised four children, she always found a way to make us appreciate what we had, and always taught us that giving back in service to others is the most important contribution we can make to our community. Martha continues her generativity and is still involved in many philanthropic organizations. Some know of the many obstacles Martha has faced throughout her life, but most importantly she has taught me as well as my sisters the value of resiliency and sensitization to the curve balls that life throws at you.

What have you enjoyed most about coaching wrestling?

Getting to know how far someone will push themselves to achieve their goals, is a perspective that wrestling coaches gain. These young athletes come to high school and have to learn something seldom taught outside of a

wrestling room, and that is to embrace the grind. Life is one set of obstacles after another, and coaching wrestling gives you a unique opportunity to put young athletes in positions to push themselves harder each day and gain this virtue that transfers to all of life. This was my greatest takeaway from the sport and consequently, what I enjoyed most about coaching.

Do you think the program will change much under the new head coach, Jason Cook?

Hobart is a homegrown program that has always embraced the ideals that making the youngest

wrestlers in our youth program better would one day translate to a successful high school program. I believe we have nourished that idea here at Hobart and Jason Cook is not only getting a group of successful young wrestlers but he also embraces our vision as a program. Jason has proven himself as a successful as a wrestler and coach. I know Jason will be supported as a coach and will continue to carry on the Hobart traditions of good sportsmanship, dedication, and hard work.

Do you have any advice for students?

This generation of students come equipped with such a great understanding in a variety of different fields and are technologically savvy. But I fear that we often overlook the value of now, and here. With the technological ability to be in so many social scenes at once, it's easy to lose track of HERE. And with the ability to scroll through people's timelines and look at all of the highlights of other people's lives we often lose the value of NOW. Perhaps the only advice I would have for a generation that has so much; would be to put down your phones you can scroll later and really learn to make meaningful connections with others HERE and NOW.
