What are you doing these days? That is, how do you spend most of your time now?

I retired from the Engineering Dept. of Methodist Hospital in Merrillville, IN, in September of 2007 (just days prior to my 60th birthday). Since retiring I have been able to spend much more time doing the things I have always loved; playing, recording and writing music and playing golf with my wife and youngest son during the golf season. I also enjoy reading, and during 2009 and 2010 wrote two books covering Hobart History, and donated the sales and rights to the books to the Hobart Historical Society.

Could you describe your educational and career path from Hobart High School to the present day?

Wow! This is not a great question for me. After HS graduation I attended Indiana State University majoring in music (vocal). I had hopes of becoming a HS music teacher. However, during the summer following high school graduation I ruined my voice singing in a rock & roll band all day on the 4th of July. I had sung on a float in the parade, at Mundell after the parade and during a dance at the tennis courts on 8th St. that evening. I couldn't even talk for weeks after that and, upon entering college that fall, was informed that I would not be able to major in music due to the damage to my voice. I switched my major to English the following semester.

After that one year, my parents had decided to move to Florida and were having a new house built there. I went down there after school was out and stayed with my Dad while the house was being completed. My mother and sister were still in Hobart, completing the sale of our house, and joined us once the house was completed.

The move to Florida and the fact that I could no longer pursue my dream of becoming a music teacher led me to make a very serious error in judgment. I intended to continue college in Florida but thought I would just take a semester off to enjoy Florida. Not a good decision considering the Viet Nam war and the draft. About two weeks after the fall semester began I got a welcome letter from Uncle Sam that ended those plans. That made my one semester off from school much more permanent than I had intended. That one semester off is still continuing. One of the poor decisions of youth!

After the military, I got a job, got married and soon had two sons, and another on the way (ended up with five sons). I had moved to Florida with my parents in 1966 and in 1972 moved back to Indiana. The move was based on the fact that I needed better health benefits and pay than were available in Florida at the time. Another big factor was that I realized that Florida would never really feel like home to me. Even though I made friends and was playing in a band, I always felt like an outsider, not having the same old shared memories, etc. as those with whom I had grown up. I found that I missed being around old friends that shared a common past and memories. There are those that say, "You can never go home again," and then there is Dorothy who says, "There's no place like home." I side with the latter. Hobart will always be home to me.

I got a job in the steel mill, in maintenance, and became a turn foreman. Once the steel mills slowed down in the late 70's I was laid off (permanently). I then got a job in the Engineering Department at Methodist Hospital as a supervisor, from which I retired. Not finishing college is my biggest regret, if only for my own satisfaction of having done so.

What are your best memories while growing up?

Mainly, just having been fortunate to have grown up in a small, friendly town like Hobart.

Many come to mind. Bike rides around with my mother, sister and groups of neighborhood kids. Sandlot baseball games, playing croquet and badminton in the yard with my parents, the neighborhood kids, and their parents. Ice skating at Kellen's Pond and Lake George, and hockey games at both. Winning the Babe Ruth League State Championship as fifteen year olds and playing in the Midwest Regional in Eau Claire, WI. At a minor league ballpark where Hank Aaron had once played. Playing in rock & roll bands through Jr. High and High School.

My very best memories are of walking along with my parents when I was about 11 or 12 and hitting golf balls while they played in a mixed league at Cressmoor CC. Also, playing golf with my dad and maternal grandfather during my teenage years. During my junior high and high school years we had a family membership at Curtis Creek CC in Rensselaer, IN, where we played often. During August, on weekends, we would often golf among, and talk with, the Chicago

Bears players, as they had their training camp at St. Joseph College in those days.

You have written a couple of books about Growing Up in Hobart, and a lot of the material was contributed by Hobart alumni. Can you tell us how you got interested in those projects, and how you worked through the process?

After retiring, I became very interested in Hobart history. I went to the Hobart Public Library and the Hobart Historical Society looking for information. I found a great deal of very interesting information. However, I found that all available material ended with my parents' generation. There was very, very little covering our Baby Boomer, post WWII, generation. I didn't want those years to become lost and forgotten. After all, we had seen the advent of TV, transistor radios, the Cold War and the beginnings of rock & roll music.

Being retired, I had the time (if not the writing skills) to take on the project. I researched, collected and wrote pages and pages of ideas, topics and facts on legal pads. The Hobart Historical Society's large amount of old newspapers, photos and old city directories was invaluable. The Internet was also a good source of info.

Once I began to organize and write the book I came to realize that my own experiences and info were not broad enough to cover the scope of the project. After all, I was a boy, so I knew nothing of the female perspective of the times. Having only grown up in one neighborhood limited my knowledge to only one area of town. Drawing on my own activities, interests and memories also limited my coverage of those times. I decided I needed far more input from people that had grown up with different interests, from different neighborhoods and with different recollections.

I decided to track down and ask my classmates, from the Class of 1965, for their information, anecdotes, recollections, etc. Nearly 70 responded and sent me their recollections, etc. For months and months I received letters and e-mails on a daily basis. Each day was like Christmas, the unopened letters and e-mails were like unopened and unknown gifts. The stories, anecdotes and memories of my classmates were amazing. I can never thank them enough for being what they always have been, great people and classmates. The stories were very open, honest and

insightful. Things were shared that we never could have shared during our high school days. Nearly every aspect of Hobart, and that era, were covered in that book.

After completing the first book, I was asked to do a second book, containing info from classmates not involved with the first book, as well as new stories from many classmates that had been involved in the first. I had so thoroughly covered the general background of those times in the first book that I decided to begin the second book with a very comprehensive section on the very early beginnings of the Hobart area and Hobart itself dating back prior to the first European settlers. After completion of the books (done non-profit), I gave copies of each book to the Hobart Historical Society along with the rights to sales and future reprints. There have been four reprints.

It ended up being a labor of love that occupied my time for nearly two years, far more hours per day than my working career had occupied (16 hours a day, seven days a week for the better part of two years). Thanks to my classmates, the books cover our years of growing up in Hobart and those times very well. It is nice to know that it has been now recorded. I have to thank Sherry Oswald Peterson for her amazing assistance with the books and for covering much of the general information from the female side. Barb Phillips Rowley, Janet Rosenbaum Will and Gail Zelenka Woods were also a huge help to us.

I have no plans for any further books concerning Hobart history, as it was covered very well in these two books and my goal was achieved. It was a very rewarding experience and has also served to reunite many old lost friends and to rekindle old friendships (a great bonus to have come out of it).

Do you have any advice for high school students who might be interested in writing or local history?

Don't let the fact that you were not a great student keep you from taking on the project. (Many of my old teachers would have been amazed, that of all their students, I was the one to have written historical books.) Get as much input as you can from old friends or classmates. Relying on only your own recollections will not give a broad enough view, and others will recall things you had either forgotten or things of which you were never aware.
