## Steve Balash, "Retired" After 48 Years, But In His 49<sup>th</sup> Year of Coaching Three Sports

Our Alumni Spotlight this month is on Steve Balash, who has recently retired from his teaching position at Hobart High School, but is still coaching at HHS.

Steve, you announced your retirement this past summer after 48 years of teaching and coaching. So, what are you doing these days?

I and my wife, help get the grandkids off to school in the morning. We then do house and yard work, and then I go off to practice!

#### <u>Alumni Spotlight</u> (cont.)

While in high school, I played 3 sports: football, basketball, and track. I also played baseball in the summer. After graduation, I attended Indiana State University on a football scholarship. I played frosh ball my first year going both ways, and played on all specialty teams. I started for 3 years, and was captain my senior year.

I started teaching in 1972 doing Woods, Health, and Physical Education. In my spare time I coached Football, Wrestling, and Track.

In Football, I was on a great staff that earned 11 trips to the state finals, earning 4 state titles! I am in my 49th year of coaching, and we made the state finals for the 12th time!

I have been coaching wrestling for 49 years while being Head Coach for 30 years. My staff and I have had 8 State Champions, and a total of 66 state placers, and or qualifiers.

Finally, I will be in my 49th year coaching track. I mainly coach the throwers. I have been blessed enough to have taken 26 throwers down state! Coaching all three sports keeps me busy!

# What sports were you involved in at Hobart High School, and then at Indiana State?

Again, I played football (2x all state), top 50 Bloomington Herald top players in the state! I also played basketball. And I threw the shot put, and high jumped in track! I made regionals in high jump as a junior, and in shot put as a senior! I played Football at ISU, and as a frosh I was the most valuable player. I started for three years, and was Captain my senior year!

# Tell us about the experience of being inducted into the Indiana Football Hall of Fame in 2009.

Hall of Fame: I have been fortunate to be selected to the Football Hall of Fame as a player. It was a great experience, and Honor to have been selected! To go along with that, was also selected to be in the Wrestling Hall of Fame with 8 State Champions, and 66 other wrestlers who made State as a placer, or a qualifier! We had 2 top three finishes in the state, and many other top 10 places.

# What are some of your favorite memories as a coach and teacher?

Favorite memories: I think I have hundreds of favorite memories! First of all, watching kids grow and get better at what they are doing. It might be watching kids have fun in gym class, or having them make neat project in Woods class! Having former students come back and tell you that you were a great influence on their life always gets to me! As a Coach, all the times the kids take you to a state event! I have been blessed having gone to 51 state events in my career! This one is silly, but one time under Coach Howell we were having a bad practice. Nothing was going right when a player found an arrow on the field. He broke it in half and stuck it in each ear hole. Coach broke out laughing and we had a good practice after that!

#### Were there any teachers or coaches at Hobart, when you were a student, who had a particular influence on the direction of your life and career?

I had so many great teachers, and coaches when I was in high school. My first was Mr. Greenberg. He started me on a journey of knowledge, and sports! Then, there was Mr. Throne. A very kind and gentle man that always made you feel special.

Then, I had Mr. Kerr, and Mr. Johnston in Jr. High basketball. Two great coaches that taught you the game, and also got the most out of you! They both moved up and were my high school coaches! Next came Coach Howell and Coach Deal. They were my Football coaches. They were both hard nosed, but fair men that made you the best you could be. They were all great role models, who became my good friends. Last, Don Rogers coached with me since 1987. He and I have been like brothers for all the time we spent together. All of these people have made me whom I am today!

#### What advice do you have for high school students today who are thinking of making athletics their career, in playing or coaching?

If you are in teaching, you are not in it for the money! You do it for the love of the kids you teach! To see them improve is the greatest gift of all!

**From Bob McOmber** (Class of 1969): My father, Homer McOmber, played in the HHS band under Mr. Revelli. I am told my dad played the french horn. My father had an unfortunate accident in junior high school that resulted in one of his legs being amputated. My father was, I think, 20 years old (maybe 21) when he graduated from high school. I assume that his health difficulties probably caused him to miss a couple of years of school. Also, my dad passed away when he was only 40 years old (I was 5) so I never had the chance to talk to him about this.

I was told that after leaving Hobart, Mr. Revelli once brought the University of Michigan band to Hobart for a concert. After the concert, my mom and dad stood in a receiving line to speak to Mr. Revelli. When they got to the front of the line, my dad asked Mr. Revelli if he remembered him. Revelli immediately responded, "Of course, you're the french horn player with one leg."
