# Karen Boruff, Historian, Former Miss Hobart, and Air Force Veteran

Our Alumni Spotlight this month is on Karen Boruff, Class of 1965. Karen shares information about North American history on Facebook, and is a veteran working to help other veterans. Our interview with Karen begins on page 2.

### Alumni Spotlight (cont.)

What are you up to these days? How do you spend your time?

I was medically discharged from the Air Force. I have MS, this has limited what I can do. I inherited the house my dad built and I grew up in. I am housebound most of the time. I am on my crutches or in my wheelchair. I read...continue to research and investigate history.

Can you describe the path that led you from Hobart High School to where you are now?

Right after graduation I took care of my kid sister, who had leukemia and helped with my paternal grandmother, who had cancer. I got a late start at university. I was ALWAYS interested in people, foreign cultures, seeing things for myself. I went to Portland, Oregon, attended PSU for a year. My dorm roommate was Yakima Indian. I went on a visit to the Rez [reservation] with her and got my eyes opened as to how very BAD things still were for Native Americans. I tutored a group of Kuwaiti students, mainly in grammar. I got to know them as people. I liked them a lot. I think my need to see the world ignited then.

When I got back to Indiana and went to the IU Bloomington campus, I continued to be drawn to people from different cultures. I dated my dance instructor, who was German, My roommate was Asian Indian, etc. When I joined the USAF, I loved the fact we all came from different areas. My best friend was Native Hawaiian, some were Mexican earning citizenship, etc. I met and fell in love with a Chippewa Indian from the Upper P[eninsula], in Michigan. He was a combat pilot, killed in Nam. I got stationed in Germany for 2 years. I could have lived on base, but felt I would learn more living off base. I was the ONLY American in my tiny German town and I did get to know the people. When I returned, I was put in charge of an AF museum at Fairchild AFB in Washington State...loved that job. I was already experiencing early MS, but was not diagnosed yet. My next assignment was Myrtle Beach AFB, SC. I was asked to join the Combat Pilot training section. While in SC, I visited all the history spots I could. I made trips into NC to see where some of the Revolutionary War battles

were fought. I had family at Kings Mountain and Cowpens...one rode with Francis Marion "the Swamp Fox". My MS was finally diagnosed and I was forced to medically retire. I came back to Bloomington, intending to get my teaching degree...FINALLY. But my condition worsened. I moved back to the Hobart area at my mother's insistence. Eventually, I ended up being my parents' sole caregiver till they both passed away at 91.

How did the military affect your outlook on life?

I think I was always very patriotic, maybe more so than the average person. I grew up hearing the family stores of my 19 multigreat grandfathers who served in the American Revolution. I was aware



the USA would not existence without the people who fought to create it. I had family in every conflict after the revolution. I was irritated by all of the draft dodgers during Nam and hated the demonstrations against the stand-up guys who served. I was at IU when a group of USAF recruiters came to campus looking for people with high IQ's. One of my history professors suggested they talk with me. I listened, took the test, and got recruited right off campus.

The military gave me a sense of purpose and got my priorities straight. So much of civilian life is petty and self-centered. I earned my right to be an American. I was always bored with "shallow" things and goals. I had various jobs in the Air Force; several were in training. By doing my job well I helped save lives, people were not injured doing dangerous jobs. The most important job was helping train combat pilots...making sure they had the skills to complete their mission and get back to base alive.

How did you decide to start the Facebook posts on North American history?

I was lucky to have a father and grandfather (both teachers), who loved history. They often took me along when researching or investigating historical

sites, in Indiana. One of my earliest memories is of asking them to tell me about the "olden times." The history I learned from them was so much more interesting than the boring material supplied in school. And much more accurate...not altered to enhance a white view. My first French ancestor arrived 1530 in what became Canada.

My family history started in the USA so very early, and the early population was so small, my ancestors were involved in most the historic events that made this country. But for me it isn't dates; it's family stories.

I am attracted to posts on FB about history, but often the info was very skimpy or inaccurate. I also posted some things about Hobart, my Hatfield ancestors, etc. People would contact wanting more information or telling me how much they'd enjoyed what I had posted. Finally in one group, I just asked who would like me to start a group on North American History. I got a lot of affirmative and some requests for specific periods of time.

So many have no real knowledge of Indiana's history and/or the New World. I felt it could be good for them to understand. Plus with the pandemic, people were eager for something interesting to distract and concentrate on.

*Tell us about winning the Miss Hobart Contest:* 



I'd call this part "VERY Reluctant Beauty Queen".

Way back in the dark ages, I was asked to participate in the Miss Hobart Contest. I was

really not interested. I was always the more serious type...outward beauty is simply a result of genetics...actually, who your ancestors were attracted to. It is only the inside that really matters.

I was attending IU Bloomington Campus with every intention of becoming a history professor. I

have always loved it and can trace my first "white" ancestors' arrival in the New World to 1532.

My little sister Valeria (11 years younger) was a different story...into princess thinking, dress-up, etc., and loved beauty pageants. She had leukemia...the disease that eventually took her life. When she heard I had been asked, she begged and begged me to do it. I could see it meant a great deal to her, so I reluctantly accepted. Val tagged along to rehearsals, tried on my clothing, and fully enjoyed the circumstances. The ones giving me migraines, LOL.

The night of the Hobart competition, I went through things...sure it would all be over by end of show. After the performances and interviews were completed, the judges had to decide, so there was a break. I was so SURE I was NOT going to even be a finalist, I went out the side door of Hobart High School's gym. I was relaxing and breathing in the warm night air. When the announcer read off the finalist names, damn if I wasn't one of them. I had to run to get back inside, LOL.

Then to my sister's delight, and my horror, I was crowned Miss Hobart. I was standing there smiling while they took pictures, but cursing inside. I knew I had to go to Michigan City and compete in the State Miss America competition. Val was at the edge of the stage jumping up and down, very excited.

I spent 2 weeks in Michigan City, learning routines, eating all 3 meals with different groups: church, 4-H, Jaycees, etc. Mom drove Val over many times, to just hang out with the girls, watch practice, etc. She got treated like a mascot.

I didn't win (thank God), but I am glad I put up with it for Val's sake. She really enjoyed it. I even gave her my Hobart trophy and crown.

For anyone curious, I made my dress. I loved sewing. It was a soft American Beauty Red. The fabric was Luminare from France, sheer with an inner glow. It had an under slip.

What are your plans for using your house to help veterans?

I thought, since mentioning the house, this article might be a good place post about it. As a disabled, elderly veteran, I know many of



us end up alone. My intention with the house is to get moved back in, and to share it with other disabled vets. Once I get moved home, the VA will make it handicapped-friendly. Plus, I can get a desperately needed VA caregiver/helper. It is on an acre of land, so room to enjoy the yard and NOT be in a nursing home. We could share expenses. I think it would be much better for us, than struggling alone. There may be some alumni who would like to share. The house is solid.

My dad had Alzheimer's and before he got bad, we talked about my sharing the house and helping other less fortunate veterans. Dad was a radar Tech in New Caledonia during WW2. His nickname, given by fellow soldiers, was "Booby Trap". If I can get a communal home going, I would like to call it "Booby Trap Boruff's Place". I want to help fellow vets if I can. So many end up homeless or completely alone at the end. The Veterans Homeless Shelter in Gary isn't equipped to handle handicapped vets. There are 2 extra bedrooms upstairs and 3 in the basement.

Once the heating and water meet Hobart's standards, I can go home. I would like to share the house with other older, disabled veterans. No rent,

just share expenses. Military understand each other, understand PTSD, and we could help each other. There would be people available that would understand.

Were there any teachers or other people in the Hobart school system who had a particular influence on your life and career?

Mr. Bigler was my favorite teacher. He was a good biology teacher, but I enjoyed talking to him too. He soon found out I loved history and tolerated my questions about his life. I found out about his being shot down in WW2, his escape through enemy lines, etc. Since both my parents taught in Hobart and Grandpa Mundell had been Superintendent of Schools, education was always important in my life. I think my father had the biggest influence on me. From the time I could walk, he took me on educational adventures in southern Indiana. He grew up there and my grandparents still lived there. We picked up buckets full of fossils from Indian Creek, Dad telling me the names, and later showing me pictures of what the creatures looked like in life. We scoured the woods for arrowheads. Collected geo...again Dad explaining what they actually were, sort of bubbles from ancient magma flows. Dad and I had many, many intellectual discussions.

Do you have any advice for high school students today who are interested in history?

Read books other than the skimpy textbooks. Find out the history of the area you live in and visit the sites there. People lived that history, so the story is much broader than what textbooks give. History gives you the REASON you are living where you are. It tells you where you came from.


