Alumni Spotlight

Dave Pangburn, Computer Programmer, World Traveler, and Bicyclist

Our spotlight this issue is on David Pangburn, Class of 1958. Here is his story. Where do you live now, and what are you doing these days?

I live in Lake Oswego, Oregon. I retired in 2004. My last job was as an IT Disaster Recovery Coordinator.

Would you describe the path that took you from Hobart High School to where you are now?

That was a long journey. First, I must start at the very beginning. My parents moved to Glen Park in the summer of 1957. That placed me in the Gary School district and I could not attend my senior year at Hobart High School. The Gary school district required about 6 more credits than did

the Hobart system. As a result, I was placed back in the junior class. As you can imagine, that upset me very much! As a result, plus the fact that I got into trouble, I had to drop out of school and forego the Fall session of 1957.

Earning a High School Diploma was important to me. Fortunately, I negotiated a deal with HHS Principal Harold Moody. He said that if I completed the credits for graduation---even though I was not a student at HHS, he would grant me a diploma. So, starting in the spring of 1958, I took a required Gary School System class each morning, and drove a delivery truck for a local florist during the day, and then took night school classes at Emerson High School in Gary. I finished all the night school classes in the spring of 1959. True to his word, he granted me a Hobart High School diploma. However, it shows that I graduated in 1959. I never was part of the Class of 1959 at HHS. I have always felt part of the class of 1958. I guess you'd call me a 'hybrid' member of that class.

I was working at the Gary Bus Terminal in the early 1960s and realized that it was a dead-end job, but with only a high school education, there was nowhere to go. Through a classmate, Gary Krischano (now deceased), I got interested in computers. Gary was a tab operator in the Accounting Dept. at US Steel and was sent to the IBM Training Center in Chicago. He was being

trained to be a programmer on the new IBM 1401 computer being installed at US Steel. I cannot honestly say if it was the curiosity of the thing called a computer, or the fact that his salary was twice that of mine. I think it was that steeled my desire to get into what is now termed Information Technology. This desire started another major obstacle.

Although I applied at many companies in the Region, none would accept me because I had no background training. I figured that, like Garv Krischano, I would be trained by the employer. Eventually, I enrolled in an IBM 1401 programming class in Hammond. Again I applied for a job in data processing, as it was called back then, and never received an offer. Still, this didn't deter me. Just as I persevered in getting a high school diploma, I continued my pursuit of getting a job as a programmer. Finally, in December 1963, I was offered a job as a tab operator and an operator of the 1401 computer at USS Sheet and Tin Mill. The thinking of the personnel department employee was that if I could program the IBM 1401 computer, I could operate it. Wrongful thinking, but at least I had an entry into computers.

My goal was still to be a programmer, so I learned to operate conventional tabulating equipment, and I operated the IBM 1401 computer. After my 30-day probational period at Sheet and Tin, I transferred into USS' Regional Data Center in Chicago. It turned out to be more of the same except on a larger scale. Even though I took a programming class in Chicago on programming the IBM 7074 which was the data center's crown jewel, management at the center barred me from the IBM 7074 computer room. A few months later

my marriage fell apart, so I quit USS and moved to Phoenix, AZ. This is where my new life began and my aspirations were realized. In Phoenix, I got a job at General Electric as an operator on a computer system that GE was manufacturing to compete with IBM (the reason for this is best told in another essay). GE offered in-plant training and programming, which I quickly took advantage of. A year after starting as an operator, I was promoted to the position of programmer. This was the Genesis of my career.

Over the ensuing years, I transferred to our office in Denmark, then to Tehran, Iran before returning to Phoenix four years later. During these overseas assignments, I traveled extensively, another goal that I had set for myself when I was a teenager, not really realizing that I would ever get to do that. Other non-work-related travels after returning to Phoenix include Vietnam, Mexico, and Australia. I am currently scheduled to go to Tahiti in September, to fulfill a dream as a teenager.

Another goal that I wanted to achieve was getting a degree. Over the next 21 years, I earned a Bachelor of Science degree and a Master's degree. You may note that the reason for my success can be summed up like this: determination and perseverance. This also applies to when I earned a Black Belt in Tai Kwon Do at age 75 – following a quadruple bypass!

When did you first get interested in biking?


I became interested in biking while living in Denmark. When I returned to the U.S., I continued biking all over various parts of the country. My biggest biking adventure was when I went to Vietnam in 1994 and rode 1200 miles from Hanoi to Ho Chi Minh City. I haven't done any serious biking since.

Tell us about the long-term writing class you are taking.

I started taking a memoir writing class in 2013 and am still doing it. Memoirs are not an autobiographic style. We write about memorable events in our lives. To date, I have written about 150 such memoir segments that I am planning to consolidate in a book titled: Yes Dear. It is All About Me. I have also written some essays and am currently working on a couple novels, Also, I have written several short stories. One of my essays was published and so too was one of my memoirs. I write as a hobby so getting published is not a concern at this time.

Were there any teachers or coaches at Hobart High School who had a particular influence on your life?

Mr. Black, my Latin teacher, was the most influential teacher in high school.

Do you have any suggestions or advice for high school students today who are interested in traveling the world?

I would suggest a career in travel, either in a travel agency, or working for a major airline. The military is an option, but you never know where you will be posted. That's really my best idea of travel.

From Greg Heuer (Class of 1965): As you can imagine I have many fond memories of my days with the band. I started in junior high school with Mr. Webb, learning to play the clarinet in a class of clarinet players. I had many fine rehearsals with Mister Spriester in the old Roosevelt gym band room.

When going to high school, at grade 10 in our case, we learned a lot about the Hobart High School Band traditions. I not only participated actively in the band as a clarinet player, but because of my training in junior high and further training in high school was honored to be the drum major of the marching band.

Because of the long tradition of Dr. Revelli in the Hobart High School Band, I only applied to the University of Michigan. I was accepted and enjoyed a wonderful four years in the band program in Ann Arbor. Those of us who attended school at the University of Michigan in the final years of the 1960s were privileged to have as his teachers the pre-eminent professors at the end of the golden era at Michigan.

I have always known that I wanted to teach, and I taught high school band for four years after graduating from the University of Michigan. Linda and I then went to Reno, Nevada to work with the Harrah family in producing musicals and training young performers. Now, 50 some years later, I am honored to be the conductor of the Airstream International Band.



From "Aurora" to "Memories"

Please visit our <u>HHS Yearbooks page</u> on the HHSAA website. All the yearbooks that have been digitized by the Lake County Public Library are there.

Volume I of "The Aurora" was published in 1908. The yearbook continued to go by the name "The Aurora",

except for the year 1921, when they named the book "Memories", and then went back to "The Aurora" the following year. The yearbook appears to have suspended publication after 1931 due to the Depression, but the library has digitized the

copies of the school newspaper, "Ho-Hi Life" for the years 1937 through 1942. The 1943 and 1944 yearbooks were still called "The Aurora", but in 1946, the yearbook appeared as "Memories of 1946", and the book has retained the name "Memories" ever since. The most recent yearbook digitized by the library was in 2015.
