Alumni Spotlight

HHS Alumnus Rick Mummey, Still in the Band

Rick Mummey, HHS Class of 1973, played trumpet with the Hobart Bands, and 40 years later, fronts a band of his own in Lafayette, Indiana. He also helps the homeless and at-risk. Rick agreed to share his story with us.

What are you up to these days? What's your current occupation, and what do you do?

Currently I am a case manager for Lafayette Transitional Housing, a non-profit org that assists homeless and at-risk people in Tippecanoe County (Indiana).

I have been with LTHC for near 5 years, after 25 years in Lafayette radio. I have a daughter Sara, who is the executive director of the

Lafayette Symphony, and a stepdaughter Taylor, who is a student. My wife, Janet, is an administrator for a

company that provides group homes and assisted living for mentally-challenged adults.

Could you describe your educational and career path from Hobart High School to the present day?

Path? More of a maze, really. After HHS, I went to college as a Music Ed major for a couple years. I ended up (long story short) in Lafayette, where my brother, Kevin, had attended school. I worked in retail, in daycare, and in a hospital before procuring a job in radio, really by accident. My name was drawn for a radio contest, and I got to play whatever I wanted for an hour on a local Classic Rock radio station (including some Zappa, and a tune from a Sesame Street record). Classic Rock, when we were in high school, was just Rock. Landed a job working overnight, then evenings, then mid-days, and the last 15 years or more were mornings. 3 or 4 stations and 25 years after starting, the last station I worked for was sold to a satellite dish. At that time, I was hosting LTHC's Bingo fundraiser, and voila! They had a job for me. It's very challenging, and you don't get rich from social work, but the rewards are many.

How did the Hobart school system shape your experiences and influence your choices?

Coming from a musical family and having a passion for music, I was lucky that the music program in Hobart was so good. It reinforced the love for music I inherited. And outside of music, I had an idyllic upbringing in Hobart compared to the childhood stories of some of the people I've met in my work.

Were there any special teachers or administrators in the

Hobart school system (from grade school up) who made an impact on you, or inspired you?

Yes! Raymond Grivetti and Herman Matlock were my band directors, and some of the best educators I've ever been around, before or since high school. They put me in the HS jazz band when I was in junior high, took us to Europe, helped me get actual paying gigs, and I'm happy to say they're both Facebook friends of mine.

Stellar people. My first grade teacher at Foreman Elementary was Mrs. James, who was the sweetest lady ever. I volunteered to stay behind and help her with the next class (which was how she described the kids who were being held back). She told me the 2nd grade needed me. There were also a couple teachers whose names I won't mention, whom I hope got some help eventually.

Do you have any advice for young students who might be interested in social work?

I would encourage kids who want to be social workers to absolutely pursue that field. It's not a lucrative field, so I'd suggest getting a degree in Human Services, Psychology, etc., become a Licensed Clinical social worker, and basically raise your profile. They can also have an effect on the future of social work, even while still in high school, by educating themselves about the issues surrounding homelessness, poverty, mental health, and more. And by educating yourself, kids, I mean be sure to separate facts from opinions. You'll be surprised at the amazing gap between those two things.
