Lyle Hatten, Former Hobart Police Officer

Our Alumni Spotlight this month is on Lyle Hatten, Class of 1958, a former Hobart police officer who now lives in California with his wife Geraldine. Lyle spoke at the recent All-Class Reunion.

Where do you live, and what are you doing these days?

My wife, Geraldine (Ahlgrim) and I live 35 miles north of San Diego, California, in the community of Bonsall. Our home is on a 3-acre mini horse ranch, and we have now been without horses for almost

6 years. I spend much of my time keeping our property cleared off and free from the threat of fire. Our last fire, called the Lilac Fire, gave us only about ½ hour notice to evacuate our home in our car and truck with our dog, bird, and very few belongings. The next day we returned and found our home still standing with some wind damage; however, 16 homes around us were destroyed. The fire had approached our property in two spots, but stopped at our fence line, thanks to God.

We frequently see our two daughters, Dawn (Apsley) and Beth (Johanson), and their families, as well as relatives

and friends from past workplaces. We also keep in contact with several long-time friends and folks from Hobart. Some of our recent trips with our family include Mount Rushmore, Crazy Horse, Devil's Tower, the Badlands, and the Hobart/Florida reunion with our daughters. We had a great time at the reunion and visited with many friends. Our daughters enjoyed taking many pictures, and Dawn was reacquainted with her first grade teacher, Kathy Throne Cox.

Could you trace your path from Hobart High to where you are now?

Upon graduating from Hobart High in 1958, I enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps, and was stationed at Camp Pendleton, California. After serving in the Marine Corps, I returned to Hobart and accepted a position as a Hobart Police Officer in January, 1962. Gerrie and I were married in 1963, and she taught at Liberty and Foreman. We lived in Hobart until I retired in August, 1979. Our family, including my parents, then moved to San Marcos, California. I started working at Camp Pendleton for the Department of Defense as base construction inspector, continuing into

supervision, while Gerrie took a teaching position. When our girls graduated from college, we were raising horses, and had to move to a larger piece of property in Fallbrook, California. As I retired in August of 1999, we purchased 40 acres in Prescott, Arizona, and built a ranch and continued to raise horses. Our first grandchild was born about 2 years later, so we moved back to California. By the way, Gerrie and I have moved 17 times these 57 years.

How did your years as a policeman shape your thinking about the Hobart community?

As a newly appointed police officer in 1962, I served under Mayor Herman Pflughoeft and Police Chief William McGinn, whom I found to be great leaders of our community. During the years, I discovered and learned many things from talking to our citizens. Several things that parents wanted were to make a good living, have a good education for the family, and a good school environment and sports system. Many parents stated that the Hobart school athletic programs were tops, and they wanted their children to grow up under this system. My older brother Dale, class of '55, said that there was never a better place or time to grow up than in Hobart in the 50's. I believe that to be true even today in 2020, and think Hobart folks also want Hobart to stay that way as well.

Were there any particular teachers, coaches, or experiences at Hobart High School, or in growing up, that had a strong influence on you?

Playing football for Coach Russ Deal for three years, a firm and strong coach, prepared me to

from him but most importantly how to better communicate with others – thank you, Paul. Throughout my Hobart police career, I became closer to these two coaches as I worked many school functions.

Growing up in Hobart, my good friend's father, Art Hanson, took me under his wing like a second dad. He was a contractor and started teaching me many areas of construction that I have used my entire life. Without Mr. Hanson's knowledge and advice, we would not have our California ranch today – thank you, Art.

Do you have any advice for students today who might be considering a career in law enforcement?

My advice for someone intending pursue law enforcement as a career would be to make your hometown or surrounding cities your first choice. as you already know the area, people, businesses, etc. If you know someone in law enforcement, talk to him/her and get his/her opinion. As an officer vou will make advancements by being on time and dependable, doing your best in every situation, and using good common sense for this type of work. Personally, I enjoyed being a police officer and felt good about it as I worked daily knowing I was helping to keep the people and city safe. Throughout the years the Hobart Police Department has been one of the top quality departments in the state. In this year, 2020, I suggest that you consider staying away from any municipality that abides by sanctuary laws. All officers today take an oath to enforce the Constitution of the United States. Please research the community you wish to serve in, and be aware of what's happening in law enforcement in our nation.

Gum in the Classroom?

This story takes place in the fall of 1955 in Mr. Hamman's class with Sophomore, Junior and Senior students. On the first day of the semester, before the bell rang, some class members were passing out chewing gum. I [Lyle] took a piece and said thanks. Several students were chewing their gum and blowing their breath out.

As soon as the bell rang, Mr. Hamman came in from the hallway, closed the classroom door, went to his desk in the front of the class, and faced us. He then started to sniff the air around his desk and looked at the students. I must have been only one chewing my gum as he walked in front of me. He looked at me, asked if I was chewing gum, and when I answered yes, he then asked if I was chewing grape gum. As I answered yes, Mr. Hamman used his strong loud voice, and yelled at me to get rid of the gum! I said "Yes, sir," walked to the waste basket, and threw the gum away. Then he yelled again and said to get the gum

out of the room. As I got the gum out of the wastebasket, he roared "take the gum out of the building and bury it!" The whole class went out to watch the burial ceremony. The rest of the class somehow got rid of their gum without getting caught. I know now that the senior students knew how Mr. Hamman hated of the smell of grape gum and they threw me under the bus!

Hobart Varsity Football Team Picture

We know that many pictures can have several stories. This story is about a '56 football team picture. When lining up for this picture, the first row was kneeling, the second row was standing, and the third row was standing on benches. Coach Deal and I [Lyle] are on the left side of this picture and preparing to get onto the bench, but the last player, Ron Ritter, stepped onto the end of the bench and left no room for Coach Deal and me. When Coach saw this, he called to Manager Bill Ledyard (first row, second from left) and told him to get a short bench from the dressing room. When the bench was in place Coach allowed me to get onto the bench with him following. Notice in the picture that we were about 3 inches shorter



than the nearest player, Ron, because the bench was 3 inches shorter. Another part of this story is that a player in the third row fell off the right side of the bench, grabbed another player and they both fell off causing everyone to laugh. But that story belongs to them.

RESPONSES TO: Working at the Art Theater

From Jim McLuckie (Class of 1947): I can provide some personal recollections about the Art Theater. In the middle 'forties **Tom Bishop**, **Jim Shurr** and I, all of Class of '47 ushered. **Gwen Sohn** and **Betty Reissinger** sold tickets. The refreshment counter was tended by **Lorraine Allen**, **Mary Dudgeon** and **Mary Lou Thiede**. There were others of course, but my memory is getting selective.

I was working the night the war in Europe ended. A great conga line/snake dance of Hobart's finest citizens came in one door, down the aisle across the front of the theater and went out. At least most of them did.

During these years the old Strand Theater located between the new Art and the Dyche drug store was sometimes operational.

What a flood of memories, most of them good!
